Benches are installed in the early Summer or Fall and cost \$950. This price includes a six-foot bench with a back, a memorial plaque, and a concrete pad installation.

Park benches in an outdoor setting have a reasonable life span of about ten years. The Village will provide for routine maintenance and repair of the bench during its useful life. The Village is not responsible for replacing the bench if bench removal is needed due to deterioration or severe vandalism. The plaque will either be transferred to another bench or returned to the Donor. Additionally, the Village reserves the right to relocate a bench if unforeseen circumstances arise due to its location or setting.

At the end of a bench's useful life, the Village will contact the Donor to offer the opportunity to replace the bench and plaque.







Trees are planted at the appropriate time of the year to ensure optimal growth (typically May & October as weather permits) and cost \$425. This price includes the tree, a plaque on our recognition board (located at Village Hall), and regular maintenance of fertilizing, pruning and mulching. The trees are $2 - 2 \frac{1}{2}$ inches in diameter, balled and burlapped. The five tree species available for this program are below.



Recognition Plaque at Village Hall.

Honeylocust – Great tree for difficult climates. Very water thrifty and heat tolerant. Upright, spreading, uniform branches with finely textured, dark green, fern-like foliage which turns golden-yellow in fall. Typical height 60-80'.

Ginko – A large, deciduous member of the conifer tree with unique fan-shaped leaves. Foliage turns a brilliant yellow color in the Fall. Gingko is long-lived and highly tolerant. Typical height 40-50'

Swamp White Oak – Large lowland tree. One of the easiest oaks to transplant. Prefers slightly acidic soils. Typical height 65-75'.

Kentucky Coffeetree – An ugly duckling in youth, maturing into a graceful swan. Its bluish-green compound leaves give a lacy appearance in summer. The flaking bark and bold branching add winter interest. Typical height 50-60'.

Elm – An All-American tree that once lined many streets and filled our parks, until Dutch Elm Disease wiped out most of the population. Disease tolerant cultivars are now available! Large, fast growing tree perfect for any area. Typical height 50-60'
