Village Administration & Finance

The mission of the Administrative services department is to provide the residents of the Village with quality public services in an efficient and effective manner which is accomplished by forming cooperative partnerships with public, private and civic organizations. The Administrative services department includes the offices of the Village Administrator and Finance Director/Clerk-Treasurer. The department is responsible for administrative and financial oversight of the Village.

Operating Budget:

The Village has a total budget of approximately \$15 million. A operating budget and capital improvement plan (CIP) are approved annually. For the most recent reports, please visit the Village website.

Tax Information:

Special Assessments:

The Village uses special assessments to finance street resurfacing projects. Assessments are paid directly by property owners located within a project area. Assessments per property typically occur once every 20 - 25 years and can range from \$5,000 - \$6,500.

Department of Public Works

The Public Works Department is responsible for maintenance of Village streets and right-of-way, as well as operation of the sanitary sewer, storm water and water utilities. The Department is staffed by a Director, an Assistant Director, a Public Works Inspector, eight full time laborers and two summer assistants.

The department operates out of two garage facilities. The main office is located at 2828 Allouez Avenue and the second site is at 1811 Allouez Avenue.

Equipment maintained and operated includes seven dump trucks with snow plowing and salting attachments, two backhoes, a sewer cleaning vac-truck, street sweeper and various other vehicles and small equipment.

Utilities

Water Utility:

The Village's Water Utility is responsible for the maintenance, repair, replacement and operating services for the Village's Water system. Water is purchased from the Manitowoc Public Utilities through the Central Brown County Water Authority. The Village ensures that the 89.05 miles of transmission mains, 2310 valves, 3 water towers, and 872 fire hydrants are all functioning properly. The Utility services 3750 residential, 599 commercial, and 11 public authority customers with an annual consumption of 411 million gallons of water.



Sanitary Sewer Utility:

The Village is committed to maintaining a sanitary sewer system by using proper equipment and well trained employees to provide efficient operation of the sewer system. The Sanitary Sewer Utility is responsible for the maintenance, repair, replacement and operating services for the Village's sanitary sewer system. The Village ensures that the 70.57 miles of mains and 1,295 manholes remain clear of obstructions and pipe integrity is maintained.

Storm Water Utility:

The Storm Water Utility maintains the Village's storm water system including storm sewers, creeks, streams, drainage ditches, and ponds. Objectives are to achieve and maintain compliance with federal and state water quality regulations; to protect wildlife, and protect private property through erosion control efforts and floodplain management.

Utility Billing:

In addition to the above, utility bills also include charges for garbage and recycling services. Village residents can choose from several utility billing and payment options. Bills are issued monthly. Please consider using electronic options; as it helps us reduce utility costs.

Residents can receive utility bills in two ways:

1. **Mail** - Traditionally by default, utility customers will receive a standard bill via the United States Postal Service.
2. **E-Mail** - In lieu of a traditional mailed bill, customers are encouraged to register for e-billing services. Customers who sign up for e-billing receive a utility bill notification via email and are forwarded a link to view their bill online.

Utility bill payments can be made four ways:

1. **Mail-In/Drop-Off** - Mail or drop-off your completed payment to Village of Bellevue, 2828 Allouez Avenue Bellevue, WI 54311
2. **Direct Payment** - Complete the Direct Payment Authorization Form to take advantage of the direct payment plan and have your payment made automatically from you checking or savings account. {Free}
3. **Online Payment** - Pay online on the village's website anytime (24/7) by credit card, check or savings account withdrawal. {\$2.99 fee}
4. **Pay by Phone** - Pay by phone to the Payment Service Network at 1-877-885-7968 between 7am - 4pm (Monday-Friday). {\$2.99 convenience fee}



Garbage and Recycling

The Sanitation Utility provides for the collection of garbage refuse and recycling through contracted services. The Village also operates a licensed compost site that Village residents can deposit brush and yard waste.

The Village is proactive in advocating the appropriate disposal of hazardous household chemicals, prescription medications, pollutants, yard waste, and standard household waste, because of the negative impacts they can have on personal health, the local environment and on the Village's infrastructure.

It is imperative that the community understands the risks associated with the improper disposal of these substances so we can all work together to maintain and improve our beautiful neighborhoods. To serve that purpose, we have a few basic guidelines and programs that are meant to serve you and your garbage and recycling needs.

In Wisconsin, you cannot put many recyclable or compostable items in the trash. Wisconsin's recycling law bans the landfilling or incineration of these materials to conserve valuable resources. These disposal bans went into effect in several stages, beginning in the 1990s. Two new bans took effect in 2010 and 2011, covering electronics and used oil filters.

The Village contracts with Harter's Fox Valley Disposal for weekly residential garbage and biweekly recycling collection. For general questions, concerns or requests for special pickup, please contact Harter's Fox Valley Disposal directly at (715) 253-2619 or (888) 804-8556.

Compost Site

The location is at 3891 Eaton Road. The site is located on Eaton Road (CTH JJ) east of Grandview Road. The gates will remain open for residential use only. Contractors may use the site provided they have applied for a Contractors Permit with the Village.

Materials accepted include grass clippings, garden materials, leaves and brush, and small stumps. The site will remain open through the Fall depending on weather conditions. For more information visit the Village Website.

Misuse and illegal dumping at the gate will result in fines and the loss of future use of the facility.

Bellevue Garbage and Recycling Collection:

Residents of Bellevue will receive two bins; one for garbage and one for recycling. These bins are supplied by Harter's Fox Valley Disposal and the resident will pay a fee for the use of them. Garbage collection is weekly, and recycling is picked up bi-weekly. More information is located on the Village website. There you will find a garbage and recycling schedule, a Village Map indicating which days certain Bellevue locations will receive collection services and a "Frequently Asked Questions" page that can help answer your other questions.



Single Stream Recycling:

Single Stream Recycling refers to a system in which all paper fibers, plastics, metals, and other containers are mixed in a collection truck, instead of being sorted by the depositor into separate commodities and handled separately throughout the collection process. In single-stream, both the collection and processing systems are designed to handle this fully commingled mixture of recyclables, with materials being separated for reuse at a Materials Recovery Facility (MRF).



Urban Forestry

The Urban Forestry Division is responsible for the planting and maintenance of all trees within the street right-of-way, in Village parks, and all other Village owned properties.

Trees located in the Village's right-of-way are property of the Village and permission is required before residents prune, remove or otherwise perform any maintenance.

East River Parkway & Trail

The Village offers over 2 miles of scenic multi-use trail along the East River. The trail runs from Manderly Way to Westminster Dr. Parking or trail access can be found off of Westminster Drive, the west portion of the Rite Place parking lot and at the end of Manderly Way.



Osprey Point—Izaak Walton League Conservancy County Hwy GV—Monroe Road

Osprey Point is an 80 acre conservancy area maintained & managed in partnership with the Brown County Chapter of the Izaak Walton League.
Conservancy Features: Two ponds used for fishing by children, seniors and people with disabilities, walking and hiking trails, a heron rookery, wild turkeys, an Osprey nesting area, sand hill cranes, deer, pheasants, and other wild life.





Bellevue Fire Rescue Department

Staffing:

The Bellevue Fire Rescue staff includes a full-time Fire Chief and six full-time firefighters. A total of 36 paid-on-call firefighters and officers also provide service to the Village. The Fire Department is responsible for fire prevention, fire suppression, fire responder services, inspections, and emergency management.

Vehicles:

The 3100 Eaton Road (Station #1) was built in 2009 and houses all fire department management, as well as the day time staffing provided. Bellevue Fire provides a first responder engine from this station to maximize coverage with the ambulance responding from the western portion of the village. Equipment housed at station one include Engine 511, Engine 512, Ladder 511, Tender 511, Command, Brown County Rehab Unit, and the Brown County Arson Task Force. Equipment housed at 1811 Allouez Avenue (Station #2) includes: Engine 521, Heavy Rescue 521, Technical Rescue Trailer 521. This station is covered strictly using the paid-on-call firefighters.

Burning Permits:

Open burning is prohibited and a permit can only be granted with the Fire Departments discretion. Open burning regulations can be found online at the Village website. Also, fire pit regulations can be found online.

County Rescue:

The Village contracts with County Rescue Services to provide paramedic and ambulance services. County Rescue is based in the Village of Bellevue on Allouez Avenue.

Recruitment:

The Bellevue Fire Rescue Department is accepting applications for paid-on-call firefighters to be placed on an eligibility list. Hiring is based on our current amount of personnel. Full-time firefighter hiring is done through an internal hiring process when positions are available. Applications can be found online at our Fire Department's page on the Village website.

Law Enforcement

The Village of Bellevue contracts its law enforcement services from the Brown County Sheriff's Department. This allows for top quality police services at an efficient rate for citizens.

Bellevue currently has one full 24 hour shift patrolled by five Brown County Sheriff's Deputies in rotating shifts. These officers' responsibilities include responding to calls for service both criminal and civil in nature, assisting other agencies, enforcing local ordinances and state statute as well as being public servants to the everyday needs of Village of Bellevue residents.

The Village of Bellevue has a "Directed Enforcement Officer" (DEO) whose responsibilities include finding long term solutions to reoccurring problems within the community through the use of community policing principals. The Village of Bellevue also has one Officer dedicated to Traffic Concerns and manpower needs.

These seven officers are dedicated to providing the highest quality of police protection to the residents of Bellevue and ensuring this community is a safe place to live, work and raise a family.

The Village's main patrol station is located at the Public Safety Building / Village Hall in conjunction with the Fire Department. However, this is not a walk-in police station, and those who require non-emergency assistance should contact the Brown County Sheriffs Department at (920) 448-4200.

Prescription Drug Drop Off

The Brown County Sheriff's Department offers county residents the opportunity to properly discard prescription drugs at their new office, 2464 Development Drive. Drop-off times are held every Tuesday and Thursday from 12:30pm to 2:00pm.

Accepted materials include pills, liquids, salves, powders, inhalers and pet meds. No sharps or biological material. Collections are for Brown County Residents only and offered at no cost to participants.



Municipal Court

The Bellevue Municipal Court handles citations issued in the Village of Bellevue for traffic and non-traffic ordinance violations. The Court's primary function is to administer justice and hold individuals accountable for their actions when found guilty of local ordinance violations. The Court imposes fines and costs, collects those fines and costs, as well as imposes and collects restitution and other miscellaneous fees. Individuals can call the Municipal Court Clerk at 884-1077 ext. 4 to receive information about the amount and due date for fines. You can obtain information about reopening a case and the extension of time to pay fines as well.

When is Municipal Court?

Municipal Court is held the 1st and 3rd Wednesdays of the month at 8:30 am. Pre trials with the Village Attorney are held the 1st Wednesday of the month by appointment only.

Where is the Municipal Court held?

Court is held at the **Village of Bellevue Village Hall** at 3100 Eaton Road
Court Begins at 8:30 am. Doors open 45 minutes prior to court.

What should I do if I receive a ticket in the Village of Bellevue?

1. *Pay the ticket before the court date as stated on the ticket. OR*
2. *Appear in court on the court date and enter your plea of "not guilty", "guilty" or "no contest". OR*
3. *Write a letter to the court or submit a completed not guilty form to the court before the court date and enter a plea of "not guilty" at which time you will be sent a notice to appear for a pre-trial conference with the Village of Bellevue prosecutor.*

If you do not take one of the above options, on the day you are scheduled to appear in court, a default verdict of guilty will be charged against you. You will be sent a notice that we have found you guilty and that your fine will be due and payable by a certain date.

Failure to pay your fine by the due date will result in one or more of the following actions being taken: A warrant will be issued for your arrest, your driver's license will be suspended, referral to a collection agency, and/or interception of your State tax refund.

Community Development

Economic Development:

The Village of Bellevue continues to be one of the fastest growing communities in Brown County and the State of Wisconsin. The 2010 US Census determined the population of Bellevue to be 14,570. That is up from the 2000 US Census of 11,828. This ranks Bellevue as the 5th largest community in Brown County. The Village is part of Brown County in northeast Wisconsin, which is the third fastest growing county in the state. The Village is serviced by four major highways, and is within a fifteen minute drive of Austin Straubel International Airport and the Port of Green Bay. Growing while maintaining a small-town atmosphere is why Bellevue continues to be a great place to live and work.

Transportation

Four major highways run through the interior of the Village. Interstate 43 bisects Bellevue as it runs from northern Green Bay to its southern terminus at the Illinois border. State Highway 172 runs from its eastern terminus at Interstate 43 in the center of Bellevue to its western terminus near Austin Straubel International airport. Highway 141 runs into Bellevue where it meets Interstate 43 and then continues north to Highway 41 and up to the Michigan state line. Highway 29 also runs through the Village as it travels from the western edge of Wisconsin to its eastern terminus at Highway 42 in downtown Kewaunee, on the Lake Michigan lakeshore.

Airports

Austin Straubel International Airport is the third largest airport in Wisconsin providing service 365 days a year 24 hours a day for Bellevue and northeastern Wisconsin. Austin Straubel is located just off of State Highway 172 in Oneida ten minutes travel time from Bellevue, and is capable of handling carrier and cargo jet traffic.

Port

The Port of Green Bay provides modern, state of the art facilities for safe navigation and economic cargo handling. The Green Bay port is the western most port on Lake Michigan providing direct route shipment between the Midwest and the rest of the world.

Rail

The railroad that runs through Bellevue is principally operated by Canadian National. The rail runs along highway 141/29 before heading out of the Village.

Planning & Zoning:

The Planning and Zoning Division is responsible for the implementation of the Village's Comprehensive Plan, Zoning and Subdivision Codes. The Planning Division services residents and developers within the community by managing land use requirements for proposed residential, and commercial projects.


The Village Municipal Code is available on the Village Website. Information is also available on required building permits. Residents are encouraged to contract the Village and review the website prior to starting projects such as fencing, decks, sheds, sprinkler systems, etc.

Geographic Information System (GIS):

GIS is an information system that is used to input, store, retrieve, manipulate, analyze, and output spatial and non-spatial data. The data is then used to support decision making for the planning and management of Village services including public works, community development, assessor, clerk/treasurer, police services, fire protection, leisure services, and administration.

The public can gain access to the GIS data by accessing Bellevue's interactive mapping system, download PDF maps from the Village of Bellevue's website, or by stopping into the administration building and requesting needed information. The Village of Bellevue recently developed an online interactive mapping system that can help businesses, developers, government agencies, and residents make sound planning decisions.

The Village of Bellevue encourages you to utilize this tool to understand your community and where you live. A vacant tract of land will unlikely stay that way in the future in this urbanizing community.





Dog Licenses

Dog licenses are available at the Village Office (2828 Allouez Avenue). All dogs over the age of five (5) months are required to be licensed annually.

License fees are \$7.00 for a spayed/neutered dog; un-spayed/un-neutered dogs are \$30.00. Dog licenses must be obtained or renewed no later than March 31st each calendar year (per State Statute). A late charge of \$5.00 will be charged for any license issued after March 31st. The late fee does not apply to puppies which were under five (5) months of age on March 31st. You must bring in a current rabies vaccination certificate from a veterinarian in order to be issued a license. In addition, to be eligible for the spayed/neutered rate, you must provide documentation of the procedure from your veterinarian.

If your dog was licensed in the previous year in Bellevue, it will not be necessary to show proof of rabies if the vaccinations are not expired. Also, it will not be necessary to show proof that the dog is spayed or neutered if you are renewing a license. All licensing fees or proof required can also be mailed to the Village Office for processing.



Bicycle Licenses

All bikes in the Village of Bellevue with inflated wheels greater than 16 inches in diameter are required to be licensed. In order to issue a license, we need to know the serial number, make, model, speed, wheel size and color. There is a \$5.00 non-expiring fee for the license. The license is good for as long as you own the bike. Should you sell or give the bike to another person, you should inform them that they must register the bike in the community in which it will be kept. Always remember to wear a bike helmet; it prevents head injury and may save your life!





Voter Registration & Election Information

Village residents vote at the Community Center, 1811 Allouez Avenue (Wards 1 –6), or at the Public Safety Building, 3100 Eaton Road (Wards 7-10). Your voting place depends on where you live. If you are unsure as to which polling place you are to vote at, please call the Village Office. Polls are open from 7 am to 8 pm.

You must register before you can vote in the Village of Bellevue. This can be done prior to the election at the Village Office, or on election day at the polls. You will need one form of identification (drivers license, paycheck, utility bill, etc.) with your current Bellevue address. In order to register and vote, you must have resided in Bellevue for at least (28) days prior to the election.

If you will be out of the Village for an election, you may vote by absentee ballot. For more information on elections, polling places, or voting by absentee ballot, please contact the Village Clerk at 468-5225.

How to Register: There are three easy ways to register in Wisconsin...

- 1) Register in person at our Village office until 5 p.m. on the Friday before the election. Check with our Village clerk's office, for other possible registration sites. You may also be able to register at voter registration drives that may be held during community events.
- 2) Register by mail. You can download and print an **Application for Voter Registration Form (Form GAB-131)** or you can contact (write or call) our Village clerk's office and ask them to send you an Application for Voter Registration Form (Form GAB-131) in the mail. Follow each instruction carefully and mail it back before the deadline. It must be postmarked or received in the clerk's office 20 days before the election.
- 3) Register at the polls on election day.


